PSHE Curriculum statement

At Cameron Vale, Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) education is an embedded part of our broad and balanced curriculum. Pupils' Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) development is at the heart of our school ethos. British Values are promoted through PSHE and the wider curriculum by supporting the pupils to become healthy and responsible members of society, as well as preparing them for life and work in the modern world. This document should be used in conjunction with the RHE Policy.

Aim

The aim of our PSHE curriculum is to deliver a programme that is accessible to all and that will maximise the outcomes for every child so that they know more, remember more and understand more. At Cameron Vale, PSHE education enables the children to become healthy, independent and responsible members of a society. It aims to help them understand how they are developing personally and socially, and tackles many of the moral, social and cultural issues that are part of growing up. We provide the children with opportunities to learn about rights and responsibilities and appreciate what it means to be a member of a diverse society. The children are encouraged to develop their sense of self-worth by playing a positive role in contributing to school life and the wider community.

The curriculum will demonstrate appropriate subject knowledge, skills and understanding to fulfil the duties of the Relations Education (RE), Relationships and Health Education (RHE) whereby schools must provide a balanced and broadly-based curriculum, which promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of our pupils and prepares them for the opportunities and responsibilities and experiences for later life.

Implementation

Cameron Vale has an embedded PSHE scheme of work for both the Lower School and Upper School. This is a curriculum devised in line with government guidelines, the National Curriculum 2014 and takes guidance from the PSHE Association. The curriculum is built using resources which are updated each academic year. PSHE is also built into school life through our board and ranging activities programme, assemblies, cultural awareness activities and through our school values.

It is essential that every member of the school community feels valued and respected, and that each person is treated fairly and consistently. We are a caring community, whose values are built on mutual trust and respect for all. At the heart of our PSHE curriculum are the school values which are reinforced during circle times and weekly in the Friday celebration assembly. We also reinforce the British values regularly throughout the week, through wall displays and discussion.

The programme recognises our shared responsibility to promote positive relationships amongst the children, to help them understand the world in which they are growing up and to prepare them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adolescent and adult life. Cameron Vale seeks to provide a safe and stimulating environment which will enable all children to learn about spiritual, moral, cultural, mental, physical and emotional development.

The aim of Relationships Education is to teach the fundamental building blocks and characteristics of positive relationships with particular reference to friendships, family relationships and relationships with other children and with adults. The principles of positive relationships also apply in the online world.

The aim of Relationships and Health Education (RHE) is to provide pupils with age-appropriate information, to explore attitudes and values and develop skills to empower them to make positive decisions about themselves. This will help them respect themselves and others and allow them to move with confidence from childhood through adolescence into adulthood by putting in place the building blocks needed for positive and safe relationships of all kinds, starting with family and friends, and moving out to other kinds of relationships, including online.

Our programme follows our ethos:

- Ensuring all children are valued and cared for as individuals
- Providing a challenging educational experience through a broad, balanced and enriching curriculum
- Offering high quality teaching that motivates and inspires children to develop a lifelong love of learning
- Encouraging children to be curious, creative and independent and not be deterred by challenge or failure



- Promoting our 5 Cs; curiosity, courage, collaboration, creativity, critical thinking, reflectiveness and ambition
- Celebrating success and achievement
- Generating opportunities for leadership

PSHE Education is a planned programme of learning through which children and young people acquire the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to successfully manage their lives – now and in the future. As part of a whole-school approach, PSHE Education develops the qualities and attributes pupils need to thrive as individuals, family members and members of society.

Links to RHE

We believe that PSHE and RHE are not stand-alone topics, but are essential learning practices embedded within all aspects of our lives.

Wider curriculum

All subjects can contribute to PSHE and SMSC and we strive to include elements of PSHE in every area possible. Some of these include assemblies, form time, humanities, mathematics, drama, sport, music, debates, our various committees and positions of responsibility as well as our enrichment programme to further enhance the experiences for the pupils.

Outcomes

- Children will demonstrate and apply the British Values of democracy, tolerance, mutual respect, rule of law and liberty.
- Children will demonstrate a healthy outlook towards school
- Children will achieve age related expectations across the wider curriculum
- Children will become healthy and responsible members of society
- Children will be on their journey preparing them for life and work in modern Britain.

At Cameron Vale we believe that PSHE plays a vital part of our education and, as well as discrete focused lessons, it is also embedded throughout the curriculum. PSHE is integral to the development of children's values in order for them to become a positive citizen in a forever changing community. PSHE is an important part of school assemblies where spiritual, moral, social and cultural curiosity is stimulated, challenged and nurtured.

Delivery and Assessment

PSHE is mostly delivered in standalone lessons by the form teachers. These lessons use a range of teaching and learning styles, encouraging the children to engage in discussions, investigations and practical tasks.

The majority of assessment in PSHE is informal and through observation. Children's understanding is evaluated through discussion, in groups and individually with children. Each class has a PSHE book in which they collaborate and share their learning and understanding which parents are welcome to see at Time to Shine.

Teaching PSHE to children with special needs and disabilities

We teach PSHE to all children, regardless of their ability. Our teachers provide learning opportunities matched to the individual needs of children with learning difficulties. When teaching PSHE and citizenship we take into account the targets set for the children. Where



additional support is required, children work with our SENCO teacher to deepen their understanding of PSHE topics and related aspects such as relationships with others.

Parental Involvement

Each term the overview is sent to parents via the subject summary which details the topics their children will be covering in PSHE. The subject summary is uploaded to the parent portal. Parents are invited to join a short termly meeting with the form teacher to discuss the topics for the term ahead and ask any questions.
